## **VALCOUR ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE**

Another season has begun at the Valcour Island Lighthouse. CCHA inaugurated 1994 activities on behalf of the lighthouse by submitting a request for funds to New York State's Environmental Quality Bond Act historic preservation program. The funds, if granted, will mean that substantial restoration of the building's deteriorated interior elements can take place in 1995. The Historical Association will match State funding from the endowment fund which was created in 1987 for preservation of the lighthouse.

Good news for the lighthouse arrived in June with an award of \$1,000 from the Lake Champlain Partnership Program. The funds will allow the Association to repair a significant amount of broken glass in the light chamber and complete other important stabilization work on the structure. An earlier grant from the L.C.P.P. funded preparation of a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places, resulting in the listing of the lighthouse in 1993.

Thanks to Art Cohn of the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum, we have obtained copies of materials in the National Archives which broaden our knowledge of the early history of the lighthouse, including official reports that ground was broken for the structure in 1873. The light shone for the first time as the spring shipping season began in 1874. The documents confirm also that Valcour Island lay within one of the 18th c. land grants acquired by Zephaniah Platt.

This year's Open House at the lighthouse is scheduled for Saturday, August 20 (storm date, Aug. 21). Capt. Frank Pabst offers his narrated cruise to the island on the M.V. Juniper for those who require transportation. Call the Juniper Boat Dock (561-8970) for information and reservations. Please note that the boat excursion price does not include admission to the lighthouse: \$2.00, adults and \$1.00, children. In the event of stormy weather, call 561-2915 on Saturday morning for an update.

Lighthouse Committee chairman Bradley Knapp says he hopes to see a record attendance at the lighthouse Open House this year and reminds us that the fascinating structure also offers an unparalleled view of Lake Champlain.

## RECENT ACQUISITIONS

A summer exhibit in the museum highlights acquisitions which occurred during the past few years. It also includes a permanent loan from the Plattsburgh Public Library of a miniature portrait of William Gilliland. The portrait appeared recently in the Press-Republican as an illustration for an article on Gilliland, an 18th settler on the New York side of the Champlain Valley. Joining Will's embroidered waistcoat and shoe buckles given earlier by Lucille Gilliland Holm, the portrait is a wonderfully evocative image of the man who achieved so much and lost so much in the turbulent early years of North Country settlement.

The exhibit includes an exquisite piece of 18th c. calligraphy given by Allan Everest; the programme for a Plattsburgh Boys Band concert, by Charles Raymond; a WW I uniform, by Joan Conway; a Currier & Ives lithograph, by Frank Morrison; a wood traffic sign from Hotel Champlain, by Joan FitzPatrick; an Ellenburg plate by Bill Laundry; a photograph of Mrs. Moss Kent Platt, by Peg Byrne; a programme for a PHS testimonial dinner, by Grace Allen; a Plattsburgh fireman's badge, by Phil Gordon; a photograph of a Plattsburgh Barracks boxing team, by Dick Ward; an 18th c. history of the American Revolution, by Harold Boire; a Town of Peru indenture, by Mary Howell; a Hotel Champlain dish, by Doris McKee; a Customs House sign, by Bob Fitzgerald; a Plattsburgh souvenir plate, by Derek Allan; a Trinity Church cook book, by Jack Myers, and an Ausable Chasm dish, by Muriel Baber. Also on display in the exhibit is a 1787 deed granting land to Zephaniah Platt which the Association was able to purchase for the museum earlier this year. Soon to be on display is a fine bottle made at the Redford Crown Glass Works donated by Sailly Warren. All of the objects decribed here have direct relevance to Clinton County in some way, conforming to the museum's collections policy which was refined and adopted by the Board of Directors in 1993.

The Association thanks all other benefactors whose gifts continue to underwrite the museum and the Association's education programs. The support of the FitzPatrick family, Mrs. Martha Bier and Mr. & Mrs. Harold Boire has enabled the Association since 1992 to establish an endowment fund for the museum and to occupy one of the most gracious structures in downtown Plattsburgh.

Funding at the state level is also critical. CCHA has received public funds from the New York State Council on the Arts since 1975, monies that have underwritten exhibitions, publications, cataloging, collections management, conservation, and education programs.
