The Annual Meeting

is scheduled for October 23, 1999 at the Angell Ballroom, in the Angell College Center of the State University College at Plattsburgh. Cocktail hour at 6:00; Dinner at 7:00; with the program at 8:00 p.m. A silent auction will be part of the evening's activities.

The program will be presented by Ms. Peter G. Rose, author, columnist and lecturer on the topic of the history of Dutch and early foodways of colonial America. She is the author of *The Sensible Cook: Dutch Foodways in the Old and the New World.* She has written numerous articles published in *Gourmet Magazine*, *The New York Times*, and *Early American Life*, among many others. She has appeared as lecturer before diverse groups worldwide, including historical societies, universities and museums.

Ms. Rose is a member of the Speakers in the Humanities Program of the New York Council for the Humanities, sponsors of this portion of the program, which is free and open to the public.

Museum Exhibits

A special exhibit at the Museum at 48 Court Street of artifacts from the period of the War of 1812 will remain in place until October 30th. This exhibit also includes three fine examples of hand-oven blue and white coverlets from Clinton County families.

Fur Trade in the Champlain Valley

This exhibit includes items from the Sailly Collection, the Booth family and the Savage family. John Jacob Astor established the American Fur Company in 1808. He was a frequent guest of Peter Sailly.

Battle of Plattsburgh Weekend 1999

With over 300 visitors, the museum was very busy. Events included interpretation of early life offered by the volunteers from the Chateau Ramezay Museum in Montreal, a hammered dulcimer recital by Plattsburgh's Stan Ransom, and a tableau of the British hospital by the British Wives Club of Plattsburgh and wounded soldiers, Caitlin Saunders and Tiffany Rawson. The Girl Scouts of Troops served as hostess. Many other volunteers contributed to make this weekend a success. Thank you all.

Adirondack Firearm Company Exhibit

The museum was the recipient of a Robinson rifle, a gift from the William Manion family of Plattsburgh. This rifle was manufactured in 1872, by Orville Robinson, founder of The Adirondack Firearms Company. Robinson, a resident of Upper Jay, New York and John Danforth Willkinson, a native of Keeseville, were business partners, operating the firm in Plattsburgh between 1870 and 1874. Information regarding this Plattsburgh based business may be found in an article entitled, Wilkinson, Gunsmith, by Clarence M. Anderson, in the 1998 issue

of The Antiquarian, available through our museum shop. We are eager to compile more data regarding this local firm and these men, can you help us?

"Recollections of Benjamin Mooers gathered together and compiled by himself in MS at Plattsburgh in 1822 - he having settled in that borough in 1783."

"1776 This year the militia were called out, and a company was formed in Haverill about June 1st - which I joined as a private for 5 months, under Capt. Eaton, Edward Wigglesworth, Colonel. Dr. Brickett commanded the Brigade = which joined the Army under General Gates at Ticonderoga in June of this year. Our army that Spring had been compelled to retreat out of Canada and had made their stand at Ticonderoga."

"After we arrived General Arnold was defeated on the Lake and his fleet dispersed - principally burnt or otherwise

destroyed."

"In June - 76 General Arnold, after the retreat of our · American Army from Canada and making its encampment at Ticonderoga, was given the command of our fleet on lake Champlain, which was not a large one. He ventured about as far North as Cumberland Head. One night the wind being favorable from the north, he took his station between the West side of Valcour Island and the Main Land. While lying there at anchor, the enemy with his fleet, passed on the other side of the Island, on the south side and blocked him in. The Enemy being an over match, yet unable to beat up, the two fleets Lay in full view of each other, had it been daylight. As it was our American Vessels in the darkness of the night, and having a favorable wind, passed through the British fleet unnoticed, nor were the sloops of war discovered by John Bull's navy, until daylight and then at a long distance in retreat."

"This information I had from James Fleury a pilot on

board one of the British Vessels."
