# Battle of Plattsburgh Commemoration Weekend September 7 – 11, 2000

Battle of Plattsburgh Commemorative Buttons will be available for purchase at the Museum in mid-August. Costs are \$4.00 for adults, \$2.00 for children 12 and µnder, with a maximum of \$10.00 per family unit. The Button admits the bearer to all events except the Costume Ball, Biathlon and Juniper Boat Tours.

Special events commemorating the Battle of Plattsburgh will begin on Thursday, September 7 with a memorial service at 5 p.m., in Riverside Cemetery at the grave of Captain Downie and other British casualties of the Battle. Friday, September 8, will feature the arrival of re-enactors, Adirondack Brass and Fireworks!!

A large variety of family activities and events are featured on Saturday, September 9. There will be a Biathlon, a Kids' parade, classic boat show, and the Glengarry Pipes and Drums from Ontario.

On Sunday there are planned tactical demonstrations, the Aiken's Volunteers Fife and Drum Corps, a symphony concert and more kids' activities.

Events come to a close on Monday, September 11, with a memorial service at Crab Island, the burial site of many of the Battle casualties.

The Museum, along with the Kent Delord House Museum and encampment, the Battle of Plattsburgh Intrepretive Center and the Macdonough Monument, will be open throughout the weekend.

A selection of the museum's collection of hats is currently shown in a special exhibit. # McMasters Prize for the Writing of History Announced for 2000

Underground Railroad Researcher Awarded McMasters Prize

Plattsburgh, NY – Underground Railroad researcher and writer Tom Calarco of Schenectady, NY was selected as this year's recipient of the McMasters Prize for History Writing. His paper, "A Man's a Man for 'a That: The Underground Railroad in Clinton County," detailed the history of the legendary network there, included a map, and identified county abolitionists and stations along the route. It demonstrated that anti-slavery sympathies in the county were statistically stronger than in any county in the state. It will appear in the Association's journal, *The Antiquarian*, in November.

Calarco, whose interest in the Underground Railroad began nine years ago, has been involved in several research projects on the topic during the last three years. Eventually he hopes to complete a book that will map out the network from New York City to Canada.

In the 1960's, Emily McMasters (1890 – 1972), Curator of the Clinton County Historical Society in Plattsburgh, NY was corresponding with Anna L. Curtis of New York City relating and recording the Underground Railroad sites in Clinton County with the then current works of Henrietta Buckmaster, Wm. Still, Wm. Siebert and Benjamin Drew of Canada. Her recordings became the basis of a later survey, complete with maps, accomplished in 1981 with the title, THE JOHN TOWNSEND ADDOMS HOMESTEAD, Comstock Road, Clinton County and A Study of Slavery and the Underground Railroad as it Pertains to Clinton County by Addie L. Shields, Clinton County Historian, Mary L. Fogarty and Gordon Pollard, Associate Professor of Anthropology SUNY, Plattsburgh.

## The Museum Shop
